Detailed Reviewer's Report

Strength of the study

- Presents a rare and clinically significant case
- Detailed clinical history and presentation
- Good use of imaging findings including MRI and CT for diagnosis
- Clear description of treatment and follow up outcome
- Microbiological confirmation strengthens diagnosis
- Relevant discussion linking with existing literature
- Practical teaching points included for clinicians

Weakness of the study

- Single case report limits generalizability
- No detailed comparison with similar published cases
- Some grammatical errors and spacing issues present
- Figures are mentioned but not clearly explained in detail
- Discussion could be more elaborated
- Limited depth in literature review

Reviewers Comments

The manuscript presents a rare and clinically important case of intraosseous emphysematous osteomyelitis in an immunocompromised patient, which adds value to existing literature. The case is well described with appropriate use of imaging and microbiological findings, as seen in the diagnostic details on pages 3 to 5. Patient consent has been clearly mentioned, which is a positive aspect, though ethical clearance from an institutional committee is not explicitly stated and should be clarified. The language is generally understandable but there are noticeable grammatical errors and formatting issues that need correction. Some sentences are not well structured and can be simplified for better clarity. The discussion is relevant but can be expanded with more comparison to previously reported cases and deeper clinical insights. The study is limited by its nature as a single case report, and this should be clearly acknowledged. Overall, the manuscript is interesting and clinically useful but requires improvement in language, clarity, and depth before publication.

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
