Detailed Reviewer's Report

- 1. Overview.** Drug addiction, also called substance use disorder, is a disease that affects a person's brain and behavior and leads to an inability to control the use of a legal or illegal drug or medicine. Substances such as alcohol, marijuana and nicotine also are considered drugs.
- 2. Addiction is defined as a chronic, relapsing disorder characterized by compulsive drug seeking and use despite adverse consequences. †** It is considered a brain disorder, because it involves functional changes to brain circuits involved in reward, stress, and self-control.
- 3. In law, a victim is an individual who suffers direct or threatened physical, emotional, or financial harm as a result of a crime or attempted crime. This legal status grants them specific rights in the criminal justice system—such as restitution and participation—beyond just acting as a witness.**
- 4. Under Marsy's Law, the California Constitution article I, § 28, section (b) now provides victims with the following enumerated rights: To be treated with fairness and respect for his or her privacy**

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and dignity, and to be free from intimidation, harassment, and abuse, throughout the criminal or juvenile justice process.

5. Applying estimates of prevalence to population figures, the survey estimated that in India, whose population is just over a billion, 62.5 million people use alcohol, 8.75 million use cannabis, two million use opiates, and 0.6 million use sedatives or hypnotics.
