*Limitations: Include a dedicated section discussing study limitations (single-center study, purposive sampling, short follow-up, potential selection bias, etc.).*



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*References: Remove duplicate references (e.g., Zhang et al., 2024 and Paramitha et al., 2021 appear more than once) and ensure the reference style is consistent.*

*Formatting: Revise tables and improve consistency in spacing, headings, abbreviations, and statistical notation.*

### *Overall Comment*

*The manuscript presents meaningful findings showing that a virtual educational program can improve the quality of life of patients with renal failure. The methodology is generally appropriate, and the results are clinically relevant. However, the manuscript requires minor revisions, mainly related to language, methodological clarification, reference formatting, and presentation quality, before it is suitable for publication.*
